**The Rev. Hank Peirce** comes from old Swamp Yankee stock, with roots in our Bay State churches that reach back centuries. He has served a number of Unitarian Universalist churches both as an interim and as a settled minister. Hank lives in Medford with his wonderful wife Rebecca and their two teenage daughters.

**The Rev. Ken Reeves** is a graduate of the Starr King School for the Ministry, and has served congregations in Ohio and Delaware. He has also earned a Masters in Pastoral Counseling and a Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology. He is currently a clinical psychologist with a therapy practice and a consulting psychologist with the Center for Career Development and Ministry. He is also the author of: The Whole Church, Congregational Leadership Guided by Systems Theory.

**The Rev. Stephen Kendrick** Stephen Kendrick is Minister Emeritus of First Church in Boston, founded in 1630, Unitarian Universalist. Stephen is the author of six books, three co-authored with his son dealing with race and politics in American history. His most recent book, Nine Days: The Race to Save Martin Luther King Jr's Life and Win the 1960 Election, was published by Farrar Straus and Giroux in 2021. He has published extensively in publications including the New York Times, Washington Post, Christian Century, and Hartford Courant. He is a graduate of Princeton University, Harvard Divinity School and has an MFA in Creative Writing from Hollins University.

**First Church Friday Folk Coffeehouse** presents its eighth concert of the 2022-2023 season featuring Andrew Innes & The Reluctant Ramblers at First Church and Parish Dedham 670 High Street, Dedham on Friday, May 19, 2023 at 7:30 pm in the Auditorium. There will be refreshments for purchase. Tickets are \$10 and are available online at <u>Folk Coffeehouse | dedhamuu</u> and at the door. Doors open at 7:00 pm.

Andrew Innes The Reluctant Ramblers make their first appearance at the Friday Folk Coffeehouse at First Church Dedham. The Ramblers draw their material primarily from Andrew's original songs which are rooted in the slower, dreamier side of indie-folk, blues, Americana and bluegrass. **Andrew Innes** (Acoustic Guitar & Vocals) has been studying and performing music for almost 40 years. Andrew started at the age of 16 with harmonica and piano, and then picked up saxophone in his senior year of high school. Over the years Andrew has fronted various jazz groups on alto and tenor saxophones; played washboard, musical saw and harmonica with the wonderful NYC-based bluegrass/western swing band, The Bootleg Remedy; Played saxophone and harmonica with indie-chamber pop supergroup Champale (featuring members of Clem Snide, Luna & Nada Surf); Spent two years in the house band for the Bindlestiff Family Cirkus; Performed for many years with Uncle Jimmy's Dirty Basement, a provocatively

unlikely collaboration between Henson-level puppeteers and an avant-garde rock band; Added musical saw, saxophones and accordion to the cinematic soundscapes of the instrumental band, Anchor Tattoo. In recent years Andrew has shifted his primary focus to guitar, dobro, singing, and songwriting and can be seen in the Boston area fronting the Reluctant Ramblers, playing with the AKE Trio, and accompanying singer-songwriter Carla Ryder. Eric Smalley (Upright bass) and Kim Patch (Fiddle) play with many groups in the Boston area including The Rozzicats, Louder Than Milk, Creek River String Band & the Bookmatch Duo. Tim Obetz (Pedal Steel) has performed and recorded with many musicians and bands in the Boston-area including Buffalo Tom, Will Dailey, Terry Kitchen, Buttercup, and The Pineapple Ranch Hands.

## FIRST CHURCH & PARISH IN DEDHAM HISTORICAL NOTES

**Introduction:** Last Autumn, while the Parish Committee was considering the portraits of Ministers in the Meeting House and cleaning out the Religious Education closet in the Parish House, I stumbled upon some more portraits of previous ministers. I asked our resident historian, Geoff Tegnell, if he might explore some of the stories of our previous ministers so that we could share them with all of you. Geoff has been working all spring and summer at the Dedham Museum and Archive (Previously the Dedham Historical Society) to gather the stories of previous Ministers and Members of our church.

## Jason Haven 1755-1803

Haven was born on March 2, 1733 in Framingham, Massachusetts, the youngest son of Deacon Moses Haven II and Hannah (Walker) Haven. He was graduated from Harvard College in 1754. While at Harvard, he was a classmate of John Hancock and one year ahead of John Adams. Haven was called to the Dedham church in 1755 and ordained on February 5, 1756. Prior to this, he was serving as interim pastor in Wrentham, Massachusetts. The church voted 40-6 to call him and the town voted 56-10 to ratify that decision. Forty years later, Haven reminisced about his early opponents that "after a little time, he had the satisfaction of numbering them among his kind, affectionate and confidential friends."

As part of the call, he was offered £133.06s.08d in addition to an annual salary of £66.13s.8d plus 20 cords of wood "for carrying on the work of the ministry in this place". He was also granted "the use and improvement" of a plot of land near the meetinghouse and given three parcels of land in Medfield, Massachusetts. In 1795, he was granted a £20 raise.

He married the oldest daughter, Catherine, of his predecessor in the Dedham Church, Samuel Dexter. He also had a son, Samuel, although two other children died in infancy, one at one month old and the other at seven months old. From his early 20's Haven was periodically afflicted with bouts of fever which would temporarily disable him to such an extent that in 1774 church leaders declared a day of fasting and prayer for his recovery.

As First Church minister Haven accomplished much. To begin with, he brought a number of young men into his household to prepare for college or the ministry. During his 40-year tenure, 14 of them were educated at Harvard College. Next, he oversaw the construction of the current meetinghouse in 1762. In addition, Haven shepherded the 1793 reframing of the First Church covenant which reflected the democratizing tendency of the Age of Revolution by instituting a new method for bringing members into the congregation. The minister would propose an individual and, if there was no objection after 14 days, they became a member of the church. He also had a new creed written which had so few articles, that all persons professing and calling themselves Christians, could assent to it without any objection. Haven underlined his support for this liberalization of church rules by stating that every member should be permitted to "enjoy the right of his private opinion provided he doth not break in upon the

rights of others." Also Haven sermons were said to be expressive and direct which led him to be called upon to frequently address public assemblies and to speak at ordinations. He addressed the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company at the election of their officers in 1761 and preached a sermon before the Great and General Court in 1769. He preached the general election sermon in 1766 and a sermon before the British Colonial Governor, the Governor's Council and the Massachusetts House of Representatives in 1769. Lastly, it should also be mentioned that Haven enforced a church provision requiring anyone who had sex with another before marriage to confess the sin before the entire congregation. Such confessions increased dramatically during Haven's term. During his first 25 years there were 25 such confessions. An observer remembered that "the females blushed and hung down their heads. The men too hung down their heads and now and then looked out from under their fallen eyebrows to observe how others supported the attack."

Haven was an enthusiastic supporter of the American Revolution which he believed granted Americans "civil and religious privileges, equal, or perhaps superior to those enjoyed in any part of the world." He had contacts with influential politicians on both sides of the growing Loyalist/Patriot divide, having dined with Governor Thomas Hutchinson in December 1771 and with John Hancock at the home of his neighbor and brother-in-law Samuel Dexter Jr. in July 1773. Haven also served as Dedham's delegate to the Massachusetts Constitutional Convention of 1779–1780. His political influence, however, waned as his health and mental capacity grew weaker with old age.

Haven had been called to minister at Old North Church, but the people of Dedham convinced him to stay. He was also considered for the presidency of Yale College on account of his orthodox theology and for "Neatness dignity and purity of Style [which] surpass those of all that have been mentioned," but was passed over due to his "very Valetudinary and infirm State of Health."

Shortly before he died on May 13, 1803, Haven wrote a final message to his congregation. It was delivered from the pulpit after his death by Rev. Prentiss of Medfield. In it, Haven entreated his flock "as far as possible, to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace; that you may know how good and pleasant it is, for brethren to live together in love and harmony. Let this be your care, particularly, in your endeavors to attain an able and faithful minister of the New Testament, to take the pastoral charge of you. Let there be no strife and contention in the important affair of settling a minister of the gospel of peace."

## **Review and Approve**:

- 1. Minutes from February 7th, 2023 accepted; no corrections.
- 2. Treasurer's Report from February 7th, 2023 approved; a large check got lost in the mail, so Erik set up an electronic way to pay bills in the future (lost check was canceled). Deacons had clarifications to the treasurer's report. Jonny suggested we pay musicians in electronic form also if possible. Jenny the bookkeeper pays bills online.
- 3. RE Report from February 7th, 2023 accepted. Alliance will donate \$300.00 to RE.

4. Administrator's Report from February 7th, 2023 accepted. Things are going OK. Farmer's market fee will probably go up about 10% this year. The Dedham School of Music is not sure what it will be doing this summer. We should plan a Welcome to New Members Sunday sometime in the near future – maybe on Picnic Sunday or Children's Sunday.

# Old Business:

-- Stewardship Committee – Steve Brayton created a letter to go out in the first week of April. Information added to the letter will be for members to let us know how they will inform us of their pledge. Will they use the Google form, drop a card at church, or ask for a stamped envelope? Pledges should be in by May 1. We will ask for roughly \$110,000.00. Kerrie will help Grace mail the envelopes to church members.

-- Share the Plate – March 26th donations will go to the Harmony Fund.

--Tech Committee – Initial goals and objectives are listed in a document provided by Mary Lynn Davis. A list of jobs in the church will be printed out and hung up in the meeting house so that people will know what needs to be done. Someone will need to take care of the cameras in church.

--Urban Ministry – A First Church field trip to the UU Urban Ministry will be organized for some time in May. The Women's Alliance will also be invited as they donated funds to fix up the First Church in Roxbury.

--Bathroom Update – A quick fix to the main bathroom will be done first. The rest of the bathrooms will be dealt with later as they are a bigger project and need lots of planning to be ADA compliant. An initial

bid has been put out. The Alliance will decide how much money to donate once the bid comes in. The Building and Grounds committee and Andrea will be working on the bathroom project.

### **New Business**

- 1. Parish Committee Rethink We need to think about how to develop leaders. Leaders experience a tidal wave of information and can be overwhelmed which leads to burnout. We need to set up people to succeed by distributing information and responsibilities to more people across the board. We also need to document jobs and think about how to bring up leaders over three years.
- 2. Mother Brook Trivia Night Another Trivia Night is coming up on April 28th. People need sign up.
- 3. Refugee Resettlement Catholic Charities started the program in 2017. Howard is our representative and met with Father Steve at St Susanna's. They are going through a regrouping period and will soon be sponsoring another family. Paquita will go to the next meeting as Howard will be away.

### Meeting Called to Order: 7:00 pm

### **Review and Approve**:

1. Minutes from March 7th, 2023 were accepted with corrections.

- 2. Treasurer's Report from March 7th, 2023 was accepted. Most things are in order. Grace will send out a reminder to people who still have to finish paying last year's pledges.

## Old Business:

Farmer's Market – Our church will participate in the Farmer's Market this summer. We will have a table with information and smiles.

3. Porchfest – Will take place on June 17<sup>th</sup> and maybe the Parish Players will participate.

4. Community Purchasing Alliance – Lisa spoke about the CPA which is a group that supports sustainable businesses that churches can use to get better deals on pricing for energy, trash removal, etc. There is an initial fee of \$300 to join and an annual fee of \$100 thereafter. The Parish committee will get more information from the website and will discuss this issue further at the next meeting. 5. Mother's Day walk – Howard will be in charge of organizing this year's Walk for Peace.

6. Youth Choir – Mary Lynn suggested that we start a Youth Choir in the church which could be a positive way to attract new members. The Youth Choir could meet once a month. We can talk with Lisa about this.

7. Parish Committee End-of-the-Year picnic – We could take Grace out to dinner for the final meeting.
