Rev. Norman Allen serves the Davies Unitarian Universalist Congregation in the suburbs of Washington, DC, and has a deep love of Unitarian Universalist history. Prior to joining the ministry, he enjoyed a successful career as a playwright, with works produced throughout the United States, Asia, and Europe. His essays and articles have appeared in print and online for publications ranging from the Boston Globe to OnBeing to Yes! magazine. You can learn more about him at <u>daviesuu.org</u>.

The Rev. Hank Peirce comes from old Swamp Yankee stock, with roots in our Bay State churches that reach back centuries. He has served a number of Unitarian Universalist churches both as an interim and as a settled minister. Hank lives in Medford with his wonderful wife Rebecca and their two teenage daughters.

The Rev. Dr. Stephen Kendrick Stephen Kendrick is Minister Emeritus of First Church in Boston, founded in 1630, Unitarian Universalist. Stephen is the author of six books, three co-authored with his son dealing with race and politics in American history. His most recent book, Nine Days: The Race to Save Martin Luther King Jr's Life and Win the 1960 Election, was published by Farrar Straus and Giroux in 2021. He has published extensively in publications including the New York Times, Washington Post, Christian Century, and Hartford Courant. He is a graduate of Princeton University, Harvard Divinity School and has an MFA in Creative Writing from Hollins University.

The Rev. David Hubner (and his small but important family) had the pleasure of serving First Church from 1980 to 1988, when David became a member of the UUA's Department of Ministry, retiring from there in 2006. Michael continued her work as an oncology social worker until 2013, She was diagnosed with ALS in 2015 and died in 2018. Her memorial service was at First Church. Ben lives in D.C. and works for the Africa Section of USAID. Rev. Hubner is our Minister Emeritus.

We continue to have parishioners who are not feeling well and/or cannot make it to worship or virtual services, and would benefit from a call, a card or a visit.



Music at First Church





First Church Friday Folk Coffeehouse presents its sixth concert of the 2022-2023 season featuring Lorraine and Bennett Hammond at First Church and Parish Dedham 670 High Street, Dedham on Friday, March 17, 2023 at 7:30 pm in the Auditorium. There will be refreshments for purchase. Tickets are \$10 and are available online at Folk Coffeehouse | dedhamuu and at the door. Doors open at 7:00 pm.

Lorraine Lee Hammond grew up in rural New England when ballads and barn dances were part of community life. Her many credits as a traditional singer, songwriter, teacher, and multi-instrumentalist include two Appalachian dulcimer books with Yellow Moon Press, and numerous recordings. A former lecturer in American Folk Music and World Music at Lasell University in Newton, MA, she helped to

launch the first UMass Boston, WUMB radio Summer Acoustic Music Week in 1996, and retired as music director at the close of 2022. She and Bennett continue to teach in the program as they have done from its inception. Bennett Hammond is a superb finger-style guitarist and recent convert to the five-string banjo. He names "The three Bs: Bach: the blues and Buddy Holly" as major influences. Bennett's songwriting gained traction during the pandemic with his "Mean ol' Quarantine" blues.

Together, The Hammonds are versatile musicians, engaging entertainers, and fun teachers. Their warm stage presence is punctuated with wry humor, and their command of their instruments and musical genres is without flaw. The Boston Globe calls them "Dazzling, witty, eclectic, delightful." The Hammonds' repertoire ranges in style from traditional Celtic and American songs and ballads through blues and contemporary music. They sing both traditional and original songs and can be heard on over thirty recordings as featured artists or enhancing the work of other performers. They make their home in Brookline, Massachusetts.

Svetlana Krasnova

She has performed as a guest artist in solo and chamber music recitals at Minnesota School of Music, Kansas University at Lawrence, Roosevelt University, De Paul University, and Curtis Institute of Music.

FIRST CHURCH & PARISH IN DEDHAM HISTORICAL NOTES

Introduction: Last Autumn, while the Parish Committee was considering the portraits of Ministers in the Meeting House and cleaning out the Religious Education closet in the Parish House, I stumbled upon some more portraits of previous ministers. I asked our resident historian, Geoff Tegnell, if he might explore some of the stories of our previous ministers so that we could share them with all of you. Geoff has been working all spring and summer at the Dedham Museum and Archive (Previously the Dedham Historical Society) to gather the stories of previous Ministers and Members of our church.

Samuel Dexter 1724-1755

Samuel Dexter was born in Malden, Massachusetts on October 23, 1700, the son of John Dexter and Winnefred Sprague. Dexter graduated from Harvard in 1720 where he received a deathbed blessing from Harvard President Increase Mather and was considered by his teachers to be a young minister of great are now potential though "severely introspective and self-critical." Dexter taught school for a while in Malden, Taunton, and Lynn and preached his first sermon in Dedham on October 15, 1722 in the ailing Reverend Belcher's stead. Dexter also delivered sermons in other eastern Massachusetts towns and so impressed congregants that he received calls from several churches, including Yarmouth, Westboro and Medford during this period before he accepted Dedham's offer and was ordained as the town's fourth minister on May 6, 1724.

Five months after his ordination Dexter married Catherine Miers of Roxbury. In late 1724 he wrote, "I have been ordained pastor of a church and I have married a wife. The lines have fallen to me in a pleasant place for situation, though the people are not so easy and agreeable as might be wished for, though they are better than I deserve and my companion is a kind, tender and virtuous woman." Samuel and Catherine ultimately had eleven children. Dexter was described as a man of delicate health, extremely modest and of somewhat melancholy frame of mind. Indeed, he described himself thusly; "This is so much my natural disposition that it makes my life very weary."

In the 17th and early 18th centuries Dedham's church was called the Church of Christ. However, at the beginning of Dexter's tenure, Dedham was comprised of what are now the towns not only of Dedham, but also of Norwood, Walpole, Natick, Westwood, Dover, and other neighboring locales. Residents in these outlying districts had grown restive because of their inconvenience of traveling to Dedham in order to attend church. Consequently, they had begun to agitate for the establishment of churches in their own areas, often at somewhat rowdy Church of Christ congregant meetings. And not surprisingly, Dexter and church leaders resisted these demands for fear of loss of congregant funding. As one town historian recounted, "He (Dexter) was here during what may be called the dark age of the town. His people were much scattered in the woods, badly educated and strongly inclined to religious contention." As a consequence, for several years Dexter was frequently confronted by, in his words, "certain sons of ignorance and pride" who dared to "insult and revile" him. However, by 1748 the desired separation of the town into many different precincts with their own churches had been effected and the Dedham

church, located as it was in the First Precinct, came to be known as First Church. It should be noted here that, perhaps animated by a hard-won conciliatory spirit, in later years Dexter voluntarily relinquished the parochial taxes of several town folk who worshiped at St. Paul's, the recently founded Anglican church.

Dexter went on to publish two sermons, one in 1727 on the accidental death of the child of a congregant family and another in 1738 on the first centennial of the church. As a successor First Church minister later observed, "Mr. Dexter's sermons were written in a serious and practical style, without any attempt at ornament or fine writing. He had little imagination or eloquence; he addressed chiefly the understanding, but there was a warmth, a fervor, a truth in his piety that, united with good sense, so pervaded all his performance that, while intellect was awakened, the heart could hardly stay cold."

Dexter died on January 29, 1755 and was buried in the Old Village Cemetery. Catherine survived him by almost 40 years, dying at the ripe age of 95. Their son, who shared the name Samuel Dexter, served in the Great and General Court and on the Massachusetts Governor's Council and their grandson, also named Samuel Dexter, was a senator from Massachusetts, as well as Cabinet Secretary in the administrations of John Adams and Thomas Jefferson.
